Why a Chairs Council?

Department Chairs indicated that they

- Wanted to increase their interactions and build relationships with chairs from other colleges
- 2. Share resources and ideas with chairs across the university
- 3. Have more opportunities to interact directly with administrators, such as the Provost



What is a Chairs Council or Chairs Forum?

- Chair-only organization, open to chairs from all of the colleges
- Sets its own agenda and works on assigned or self-generated tasks independently of other administrators
 - May address public issues, such as policy, curriculum, budgets, and workloads
 - May address personal challenges, such as dealing with a difficult faculty member
 - Support and provide resources for new department chairs
- May provide an avenue for both horizontal communication between department chairs and vertical communication to higher administrators

Why Might We Want to Establish a Chairs Council?

- Increase the interactions between chairs across all of the colleges
 - Discuss common issues
 - Foster collaborations and create synergies
- Provide direct interactions with key administrators and offices, such as the Provost,
 Student Services, Admissions, and Marketing & Communications
- Create opportunities for professional development
 - Technical training (eg. COP, budget)
 - HR training, such as how to supervise support staff
 - Communication and how to have difficult conversations
 - How to review and evaluate requests by faculty (eg. sabbatical requests)
- Share resources, best practices, and "how to" among department chairs
- Make suggestions, raise objections, and grant endorsements as a collective, and perhaps more influential, voice

Possible Formats

- Formal:
 - Elected officers, by-laws for operation
 - Meetings with full agendas and recorded minutes
 - Defined expectations
- Informal:
 - No defined leadership structure
 - Limited agenda
 - No assigned tasks
- Hybrid or semi-formal model

Example: Chair of Chairs Private Liberal Arts College in Indiana

- Informal meeting once a month
- Attendance is not required but it is considered part of chair duties
- One person (3 years term) serves as the Chair of Chairs and runs the meeting
- Agenda is set by the group, topics include things that affect people across the college
- Senior administrators attend if an issue rises that requires a broader conversation
- The Chair of Chairs meets with administrators as needed to communicate questions or concerns from the chairs meeting so they can report back to the group
- The Chair of Chairs advocates on behalf of the group
 - Useful during negotiations regarding compensation and when an updated list of chair duties was being drafted
